It's Ottawa's Time to Lead!

On Wednesday, April 30, friends of the Council on Aging lit up the Trillium Ballroom of the Ottawa Conference Centre with their warmth, enthusiasm and insights at the Annual Spring Luncheon, cloudy unspring-like weather notwithstanding.



Mayor Jim Watson commends AFO and City partnership

Age-Friendly Communities was the theme of this year's Luncheon. We were honoured to have Mayor Watson provide an update on the City of Ottawa's Older Adult Plan, in which 12 City departments specifically considered the needs of older adults. Initiatives range from increased access to dental care and computers, to the development of age-friendly design guidelines for City Parks, and certifying City staff in older adult fitness. He commended the great partnership with the Council on Aging, and recognized it as a key factor in the decision

of the World Health Organization to grant Ottawa membership to its Global Network of Age-Friendly Cities.

This year's keynote speaker was Dr. Samir Sinha, provincial lead of Ontario's Seniors

Strategy and Director of Geriatrics at Mount Sinai and the University Health Network Hospitals. He also holds appointments at both the University of Toronto and Johns Hopkins Schools of Medicine. Dr. Sinha's speech, [*Age-Friendly Communities: Pipedreams or Possibilities?*](#), provided an overview of the provincial Seniors' Strategy, developed as part of the province's commitment to make Ontario the best place to grow up and grow old. He noted that the Age-Friendly Communities Framework had contributed to the development of the provincial strategy.

Dr. Sinha offered an incredibly well-informed perspective and it was abundantly clear the extent to which he listens to and engages with his patients and the



many thousands of older people consulted in the development of the strategy.

He summarized his comments by emphasizing the value of the continuing contribution of older adults in creating caring communities for people of all ages. He also applauded the leadership of the City of Ottawa and the Council on Aging for the extent to which they have forged their partnership, concluding with the remark that “This is Ottawa's time to lead”.
